Dear Parents and Carers,

Thank you for the support parents gave pupils at the Quads event at the Abbey Stadium, with some of you there to cheer on the competitors, while others acted as a taxi at the end of the event. We did very well in many of the events, and the way that our pupils competed was a testament to the values we hold as a school.

There was an enjoyable football tour last weekend, with victory for the Year 7 team. Good weather enabled all games to proceed as planned, and the conduct of all the lads who took part was superb.

As there have been Transfer Days on Wednesday and Thursday, there has been a lot of activity, both here at Walkwood, and for Walkwood pupils at the high schools.

For two days our pupils moved up a year, in effect, and so made room for the incoming Year 5s. This meant that the new Year 7s (current Year 6s) had their first break and lunch times on the back playground. That also means that the football is not a sponge one! The buddies for the new pupils have been great at ensuring the new Year 5s have been where they need to be at (roughly) the time they need to be there.

There have been many comments about the enjoyment that our new pupils have experienced over these two days, and how tired they are at the end of them! A lot of work goes into making these transfers as smooth as possible. Walkwood staff have talked with first school staff, and in many cases, Walkwood pupils have interviewed the new children and answered their questions. Naturally, concerns arise, and we work to overcome challenges. Year 8 have returned from their high schools, with many saying how they will miss Walkwood, and yet they appreciate it is time to grow yet further in their confidence.

Pupils make good progress

during their time at school. A well-taught and broad curriculum ensures that most pupils work at or above age-related expectations.



That is one of the sentences in the Ofsted report for our school. Behind it is something rather brave - here at Walk wood we do train pupils to complete their SATs, but rather we look for them to have a wide range of subjects through out their time with us.

Of course, that does not mean we ignore SATs. We prepare pupils through their English and Mathematics lessons, and change only a few times in order to ensure pupils do not get stressed. The children have other subjects that use different skills, so they have variety during the day. This is a benefit from a middle school that has its pupils moving around the building.



In the coming weeks, pupils in all years will take some assessments. These are matched against other pupils of the same year group across the country. The **ssessment** tests allow us to know how much progress that our pupils are making.

It is because of these assessments that we know that around 85% of Walkwood pupils leave our school working at standards that are above their age in English and Mathematics.

Please remember that it is not just about 'the results' for pupils. Even at GCSE and above, it is about how students think, behave and respond. Ofsted said:

"Many teachers balance the development of pupils' subject knowledge, skills for learning and positive attitudes very skilfully. They blend the lesson objectives with the development of 'superhero learning traits' and promote pupils' understanding of the 'fruits of faith'."

They finished by saying:

"During their time at school, pupils develop into confident, hardworking and articulate pupils. They acquire good social skills, develop tolerance of others and are resilient."



On Tuesday 3rd July Walkwood were lucky enough to compete at the school games. I was also lucky enough to compete and it was an amazing day – and I am going to tell you about what we did in archery. We started off with two fun practice games - the first game was that we had to try to get all 3 or 4 cones with our arrows. The second game was that we had to get our arrows in the middle of the set of cones. After we had finished those games it was lunchtime and after lunch we went back to the arena.

We had two more games; when you landed an arrow on a black piece of the board you got two beanbags, on the red you got three beanbags and on the yellow you got four beanbags - you needed a partner for this game, so the other person had to throw the number of beanbags of the score that their partner got - the hoop furthest away was worth 10 points - the closest was worth 1 point - I managed to score 39. The last game was normal archery which was very hard. When the scores were added together Walkwood came 3rd and took the bronze which was amazing and I think that the bronze looks better than the gold!


