Dear Parents and Carers,

After we had published last week's Insider, three senior pupils and I were at the *No Barriers* awards at Redditch Town Hall. These accolades recognise the people and organisations who go the extra mile for people with disabilities. The citation is below, and is particularly poignant as it demonstrates one of our Fruits of Faith in action, namely, inclusiveness. We thank Disability Action Redditch, lead by Councillor Anita Clayton, for the award and for the warmth of the welcome at the event.

There has been a steady selling of tickets for the Arts Evenings, and the rehearsals have continued this week. "It'll be alright on the night" has applied to all the productions I have known over the 30 years in education, but the Arts Evenings always have an appropriate blend of different acts and performances. 



#### **Year 6 Maths Revision Sessions**





#### **Attendance Matters at Walkwood - The Traffic Light Initiative**

The 'Traffic Light Initiative' is intended to raise pupil attendance levels.

The colours of a traffic light are being used to indicate the level of school attendance.

RED = below 90%, AMBER = between 90% and 95% and GREEN = 96% and above.

Our goal is that all pupils meet the green target of 96% and above. Details of your child's attendance can be found on Epraise or recorded weekly, by the tutor, in your child's planner.

#### 96-100% attendance- Making every effort to attend school.

Your son or daughter is an excellent attender and as a result, they will almost certainly achieve the best grades for their ability. They will also be able to take full advantage of the wider school community and will develop skills for life that will provide great opportunities in further education and the world of work.

90-95% attendance- Resulting in 2-4 weeks missed of school per year.

This level of attendance will make it difficult for your son/daughter to achieve their full potential. They will have to work hard to catch up on the work that they have missed.

Below 90% attendance- Resulting in well over 4 weeks missed per year or 2 full years missed over the course of their school career.

This level of attendance makes it extremely difficult for your son/daughter to keep up with lessons or work. They will also have difficulty contributing fully to the school community and will miss key life skills in readiness for the world of further education and work.

Additionally, as a parent you could be investigated, and found guilty, of failing to ensure your child attends school in line with current education and school attendance laws within the UK.

70% attendance- Attending 3½ days each week = more than a quarter of the school year missed

(9 weeks per school year)

Being late for school also reduces learning time.

If your child is 5 minutes late every day they will miss three days of learning each year. If your child is 15 minutes late every day they will miss 2 weeks of learning each year.

#### Playground Equipment

During the Autumn Term, Walkwood Middle School have improved the playground equipment with money raised over the previous 18 months through the Albion Foundation and various fundraisers. With the money raised we have purchased 3 table tennis tables, 2 table football tables and a number of basketball hoops and balls. Pupils have been getting involved and enjoying it so far. It certainly gives us something to do.

Possibly the most enjoyable pieces of equipment are the table tennis tables. They are located on the front and back playgrounds. There are pupils playing games during break times that they would not usually play, so it is fantastic to have these opportunities. Walkwood has supplied its pupils with enjoyable and quality equipment and the students have really appreciated it.

The Albion Foundation will be in again in the Summer Term and hopefully again we can raise lots of money to further improve the facilities in school for the enjoyment of the pupils.




