Abberley - The Inn

The Inn is traditionally thought to be the place where Jesus was born. After the long journey to Bethlehem, because of the census, Mary and Joseph found that there was nowhere to stay. An innkeeper allowed them to stay in a stable usually used to hold animals. We get this idea because the Bible states that Jesus was born in a 'manger' which is a feeding trough for animals. However, it does not state that it is a stable and ancient tradition held that it is more likely that Jesus was born in a cave, used as a shelter for animals. In the traditional nativity story there is an innkeeper; however, there is no such character in the Bible.

Bredon – The Lowly and the Royal

The Lowly refers to the shepherds that visited the baby Jesus and the Royal refers to the three wise men/Kings/Magi that visited the baby Jesus. Traditionally, both sets of people brought gifts to the baby Jesus - the shepherds brought a lamb and the Magi brought gold, frankincense and myrrh, all of which have a symbolic meaning. The visit of the shepherds represents the humility of Jesus and that He came to earth for the poor and lowly people. The visit of the Magi represents the royalty of Jesus and that He was the King of the Jews.

Cleeve – The Star

The Bethlehem star is a prominent feature in the nativity story. It acts a guide for the Magi (wise men) that would lead them to the baby Jesus. Nobody is absolutely sure what the star was, but there are various different theories.

One thing we do know though is that it was something very unusual.

Malvern- The Journey

Mary and Joseph were required to travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem (the home town of Joseph & Mary) because of a census decreed by Caesar Augustus. It would have been a long and arduous journey, of more than 70 miles through mountainous terrain, made more difficult by the fact that Mary was heavily pregnant at the time. It is traditionally thought that they travelled by donkey.

Sporting Success

Eughan Downing has been karting since the age of 6 years old and obtained his MSA National B Karting Licence in order to allow him to race at 'club' level in November 2016 shortly after turning 8 years old. During 2017, Eughan competed at club level and managed to finish in the top 10 of the Shenington Kart Club, Kimbolton and Little Rissington Annual Club Championships.

Based on this success, Eughan then progressed and this year competed at National Level in the '2018 Northern Karting Federation' Championships, which were nine rounds throughout the UK, Scotland and Wales. Eughan again finished in the top 10 (9th). The awards presentation where Eughan received his trophy was hosted last month at Silverstone.

Next year will now be his hardest in the cadet class (age 8-13 years) as he will be competing in the official 2019 MSA British Karting Championships, the highest level of competition and competing against the best drivers in the UK, with the winner of that being eligible for a 'works drive' to compete all over Europe the following year against the best drivers in the world. Previous winners of this include Lewis Hamilton, Jenson Button and Max Verstappen who are now all F1 racing drivers.
